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### CELEBRATING THE POWER OF COMMUNITY One Raised Hand at a Time

You've seen many of our neighbors struggle this past year with the effects of inflation, as prices increased rapidly for school supplies, food, housing, and nearly every other necessity. Despite these challenges, together we made significant progress in bridging opportunity gaps and improving access to education, income, and health for people in southern Winnebago County.

We talk about how "together" we can create change, and how small gifts can still make a big impact. Remarkably, 40% of our donations are \$100 or less, demonstrating the power of Collective Impact.

In the following pages, you will see shining examples of all that we can accomplish when we work together.

In 2023, new investments in OAUW targeted initiatives such as supporting and expanding childcare resources and amplifying the OAUW Volunteer Center — VolunteerOshkosh.org — significantly expanded our impact in Oshkosh and the surrounding area.




### UNITED FOR IMPACT Strengthening Your Community

In 2023, you invested over **\$1,500,000** to serve residents across southern Winnebago County through the work of OAUW programs and partnerships with local nonprofits. You can see the areas of impact in the chart to the right.

As we shift our approach to serving your community, we recognize that our strength lies in our relationships and our ability to unite and collaborate. We strive to make a significant and lasting impact on our service area by advocating for, creating, leading, and investing in programs that focus on youth-focused education, mental health, and financial stability. These overlapping yet independent initiatives are the building blocks of opportunity.

By supporting OAUW through donations, volunteerism, and advocacy, YOU play a crucial role in the collective IMPACT that helps improve the lives of thousands of your neighbors across Oshkosh and the surrounding area.



#### ADVOCACY Access Through Local Legislature

Our public systems play a vital role in ensuring that everyone has access to the support they need to thrive. When Oshkosh Area United Way was asked to be part of the Winnebago County ARPA Commission, we gladly accepted the challenge.

Through various sessions, it was determined that over \$16,000,000, representing half of the county's total award, would be allocated to Government Identified Projects. The Commission was responsible for selecting projects that would provide a wide range of services across our county and create a lasting impact.

Oshkosh Area United Way contributed our expertise on key issues and spearheaded efforts to ensure that a portion of the funding would support our most vulnerable community members. We proudly endorsed initiatives designed to expand access to food, shelter, childcare, emergency and crisis response, and community safety.

Our efforts succeeded when the Winnebago County Board of Supervisors voted to approve **25 resolutions that touch on our education, income and health goals**:

- \$ 2.8 MILLION in funding secured for early childhood development programs
- \$2.4 MILLION in crisis response and mental health initiatives
- \$4.1 MILLION in emergency response and community safety
- \$7.1 MILLION to clean water, community development, and conservation

Your investment in OAUW has strengthened our ability to advocate for our community.

#### CROSS-SECTOR COLLABORATION Together, We Are Stronger

So much happens in a child's first years. Long before kindergarten, children begin to see the world, forming the patterns of thought and behavior that will shape the rest of their lives. During this time, trusted caregivers can make a huge difference.

OAUW is proud to be a founding member and convener of the Greater Oshkosh Childcare Taskforce, a first-of-its-kind initiative. In 2022, we unveiled our new early childhood initiative, supporting new career pathways in childcare and expanding existing programs. This initiative requires both public and private funding.

In 2023, the taskforce completed the final phase of a federal childcare-focused grant and was awarded **\$75,000** from Dream UP! to enhance local childcare resources. We united with our community partners—GOEDC, Child Care Resource & Referral, Winnebago County Public Health, Oshkosh Chamber of Commerce, and the Oshkosh Area Community Foundation—and collaborated to **distribute funds to 18 family and group childcare providers** throughout Oshkosh. These funds helped centers stay open by offering support for radon mitigation systems, fencing and building repairs, technology and educational resources, and the training needed to license new providers and open critical childcare slots.

These efforts solidified the importance of the Greater Oshkosh Childcare Taskforce in addressing capacity challenges and finding solutions.

#### VOLUNTEER CENTER Your Time is Valuable, but Your Impact is Priceless


Volunteers are essential for keeping costs down for nonprofits, showing the next generation how they can make a difference, teaching young leaders additional skills, and enabling community members to give back while discovering new resources. Recognizing the need for a central volunteer center in Oshkosh, OAUW launched the user-friendly website, VolunteerOshkosh.org, in December 2019. In 2023, **40,378 volunteer opportunity views**, a 51% increase in views from the previous year, led to **727 volunteers responses** to over 200 Oshkosh area opportunities, a 66% increase in responses over 2022.

OAUW's 26th Annual Day of Caring saw 170 volunteers from over 24 local companies, families, and individuals come together to make a difference. Your dedication impacted community members and nonprofit staff across 26 projects in Oshkosh and Omro. In just one morning, you logged 510 volunteer hours, valued at \$16,218. Your commitment embodies the spirit of LIVING UNITED, allowing area nonprofits to focus resources on critical areas.

### NONPROFIT AMPLIFICATION The Power of Our Network

In 2023, we partnered with more than **45 direct-service programs** throughout the greater Oshkosh region. While we are here to serve the entire community through volunteering, kit packs and donations, **no one person or organization can do it alone**. We prioritize funding to partners that provide access to youth-focused education, mental health, and financial stability.

Collectively, we call this set of partners our Community Investment Portfolio. Your donations help fuel these partnerships to support a robust nonprofit sector providing access to:

- Comprehensive **early education and youth programs** aligned with developmental and cultural needs.
- Essential **mental health** programs and services that provide counseling, resources, and support to individuals and families in our community.
- Vital food, shelter, and holistic services to stabilize lives, work-related transportation, job training, and **financial** education to empower individuals.

#### **YOUTH-FOCUSED EDUCATION**



The annual Back 2 School Fair event, organized by nearly 20 nonprofits including OAUW, serves low-income and at-risk populations in the OASD. With 41% of Oshkosh area residents not being able to afford their basic needs\*, the fair provides essential school supplies, clothing, hygiene products, and shoes. This sets students up for success as they begin the new school year.



Supporting young learners when they need it most improves their social skills, behavior, academic achievement, and self-confidence. Creating spaces where kids have opportunities to learn and grow increases graduation rates and opens the door to a stable future.



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Literacy is the foundation for life skills. Students falling below the proficient benchmark risk falling behind in reading and other developmental areas.

Your generosity directly addresses this challenge through the Growing Readers after-school tutoring program, a collaboration between the University of Wisconsin – Oshkosh and the Oshkosh Area School District (OASD). This program targets 3rd-grade students, the critical stage when children transition from learning to read to reading to learn. UW-Oshkosh students provide one-on-one tutoring to young learners for at least three hours a week, helping them reach grade-level proficiency.



#### MENTAL HEALTH

Your local mental health programs are vital for community well-being. Untreated mental health challenges can lead to unemployment, homelessness, substance abuse, suicide, and poor quality of life, highlighting the urgent need for us to prioritize mental health support.



The 2023 mental health survey by the Professional Fire Fighters of Wisconsin Charitable Foundation and Rogers Behavioral Health revealed alarming findings about firefighters' mental health. Of the 93% who reported exposure to traumatic events, approximately

16% experienced depression, 17% screened positive for anxiety, 14% experienced self-harm ideation, and over 8% experienced PTSD in the past two weeks. This data highlights the need for robust and comprehensive mental health support for your community's public safety professionals.

A major obstacle is the stigma surrounding mental health in the firefighting community, with only 63% willing to seek behavioral health support, though 98% would encourage a colleague to seek help. To combat this, the Oshkosh Fire Department has enhanced the accessibility and effectiveness of mental health resources.

With your support, the Oshkosh Fire Department has taken proactive strides to bolster mental health resource accessibility and effectiveness by investing in a Peer Support Team to focus on uniform training, competency maintenance, and resource provision to better support your firefighters.

By providing on demand rides, Access to Jobs helps meet the employment-related transportation needs of qualifying, low-income individuals when buses are not in service or don't have a stop within reasonable walking distance. This also includes child care transportation related to employment.

Nearly 40% of those that qualified for the program in 2023 wouldn't have without your support.



#### **FINANCIAL STABILITY**

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With over a third of households in our service area making tough choices between quality child care and paying rent, financial stability is a key focus for your OAUW.

Farmers Market's Bonus 10 Program, funded by you, encourages SNAP/EBT benefit use to purchase healthy, locally produced foods, enhancing family nutrition by doubling

purchasing power with a \$10 weekly match. This program is vital for low-income individuals, the disabled, and the aging population, helping them make it through the month and keep their families fed.

The Bonus 10 Program boosts EBT customers' ability to buy healthier food, supports family eating habits, influences future generations' food choices, and bolsters local food producers' business, contributing to a successful market.

Your generosity fostered collaboration and bridged critical service gaps, directly benefiting your friends, family, neighbors, and coworkers.



Children with overlooked or unmet developmental needs can be at risk for mental illness, bullying, educational decline, and generational poverty.

Because of you, BBBS breaks this cycle through mentoring, as the power of one strong adult relationship is a key ingredient in resilience – a positive, adaptive response in the face of significant adversity.
